





## WITCH-HAZEL Hamamelis virginiana L.

Titch-hazel occurs as a small tree or shrub in most parts of Maine except in the far north. It is found on borders of the forest in low rich soil or on rocky banks of streams.

The bark is gray-brown and somewhat scaly on older stems. The leaves are alternate, broadly obovate, nonsymmetrical at the base, and have a wavy margin.

It has bright yellow flowers with thread-like petals in autumn or early winter. The fruit is a woody capsule, usually two in a cluster. The seeds are discharged fiercely when ripe.

The twigs are gray, zigzag, with gray or rust-colored hair and scalpelshaped buds.

An extract from the bark is mixed with alcohol and used as an astringent.
