My family has a camp in Holden. We have canoed and rowed the ponds in the area, hiked and snow-shoed the hills and generally enjoyed what we have called 'paradise' for all our lives. Some of the most important qualities that make our experience whole and so special are its near-pristine and cherished vistas. We are not visiting the area to see wind farms. Nor are a good chunk of the 35 million tourists that visit 'Vacationland' these days. Tourism, being the 3rd largest industry in the state.

Adding these new taller wind turbines to the existing turbines will only add insult to injury - and on a larger scale. It will impact more hills, mountains, lakes and ponds than are mentioned in the study details. It seems many of the uninhabited landscape features in the area are missing from the study. Take Big Hill for example, which has some beautiful vistas. It's near impossible for an uninhabited pond or peak to protest such an intrusion, but it's exactly those places that make the area special and attract recreational users.
