



# FORTS, LAKES, & TOWNS OF THE PROVINCE OF MAINE, 1794







# J U L Y 4, 1776. REPRESENTATIVES UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, WHEN in the Course of human Events, it becomes necessary for one People to diffore the political Banks which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the Earth, the separate and equilibration to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent Respect to the Opinions of Mankind requires that they should declare the Cause which impel when to the Separation. We hold that Tourks to be collected when the separation are related to the position of the po

ther, and to affirme among the Powers of the Earth, the feparate and equitable when, a decent Refepete to the Opinions of Mankind requires that they flouid declare the Cauties which impel them to the Separation.

Whe hold their Truths to be felf-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain undicable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happines:—That to secure their Rights, Governments are inflituted among Men, degiving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed, that whenever any Form of Government becomes defructive of their Ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to inflitute new Government, laying its Foundation on such Principles, and general powers in such Form, as, to them shall seem most likely so cried their Safety and Happinesis. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transferance and the contractive of their forms to which they are accurdenced. But when a long Train of Abules and Userpations, pursuing invariably the same Object, evinces a Design to reduce them under absolute Despotsin, it is their Right, it is their Duty, to shrow off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future Security. Such has been the patient Sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the Necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Governments. The History of the prefent King of Great-Britain is a History of repeated Injuries and Usurpations, all having in direct Object the Establishment of an absolute Tyranny over their States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid World.

In every Stage of these Oppreliens we have petitioned for Redersi, in the most humble Terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated Injury 1—A Prince, whose Character is thus marked by every Ac Nor have we been wanting in Attention to our British Brethren. We have awared them from Time to Time of Attempts by their Legilature to extend an unwarrantable Jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the Circumflances of our Emigration and Settlement here. We have appealed to their native Juftice and Magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the Ties of our common Kindred to difavow these Ujarpations, which would inevitably interrupt our Connexions and Correspondence. They too have been doed to the Voice of Justice and of Confinguinity. We must, therefore, acquicte in the Necessity which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the reft of Mankind, Enemies in War in Peace, Priends.

We, therefor, the Riperberg value of the World for the Relitude of our Intentions, do, in the Name and by the Authority of the good People of their Colonies, formuly Publish and Declare. That their United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be, Free and Independent People of their Colonies, formuly Publish and Declare. RDERED, That the Declaration of Independence be printed; and a Copy feat to the Ministers of each Parish, of every Denomination, within this STATE; and that they severally be required to read the same to their respective Congregations, as soon as divine Service is ended, in the Asternoon, on the first Lord's-Day after they shall have received it:---And after such Publication thereof, to deliver the faid Declaration to the Clerks of their feveral Towns, or Diffricts; who are hereby required to record the fame in their respective Town, or District Books, there to remain as a perpetual MEMORIAL thereof.
